

## Western Primary School - Sports Funding 2022-2023

Since March 2013, the government has been allocating schools with a dedicated PE and sports premium 'to make additional sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport they offer'. Western Primary School is eligible and therefore received £20,150 of Sports Premium Funding for the 2022-2023 academic year.

The following table shows how the Health Matters Team – responsible for the provision of an outstanding PE curriculum and extracurricular opportunities at Western Primary School – integrated these contributions, working towards improving the health and well-being of the children. It is apparent that our total expenditure this year has almost exceeded our Sports Premium allocation; this reflects the extent of our commitment to the development of PE and Sport here at Western. A total of £1,813 will be added to the funding allocation for the academic year 2023-2024.
