

Green Room

As we continue to learn more about The Great Outdoors, we look at different ways in which we could sleep outside of our homes. We thought really hard about this question and decided that we could camp in a tent, sleep in a caravan or even a campervan.







Based on this answer from the children, we turned our role play area into a tent with sleeping bags and coloured fabrics draped over the top. The children were filled with delight on Monday morning when they found this transformation. We have had so, so, so much fun in there this week.

In Maths we have had a look at repeating patterns. We started with A and B, we then challenged the children further to see if they could repeat an ABC pattern. The children found this activity really fun and they enjoyed the challenge.



We have used our funky fingers to wrap wool around some of the sticks that were brought in to us last week and continued to develop our love of drawing and colouring.

In our creative area we have enjoyed the following: pinecone rolling using brightly coloured paint, making sun catchers, using the natural treasure that has been brought in to class and also using our memory to paint some of the things we see outside whilst walking, such as trees, the sun in the sky or a pretty flower.

This week our key story has been, 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar'. The children have really enjoyed listening to the story and have requested it several times over. Our older children have also been retelling the story in their own words. The story has inspired lots of caterpillar themed activities. We will be continuing with the caterpillar and butterfly theme throughout next week too.









The children have also thoroughly enjoyed being outdoors this week as we have enjoyed the dry and sunny weather. On Tuesday we spent the whole day outdoors. The children have been exploring the water wall and also bathing the dolls.

Purple Room

This week has been a huge reminder that children are just fabulous! They have come in with such a creative idea of making a fish tank and have then planned and gathered the resources they needed to create their desired finished product. We have had fish swimming in a beautiful blue lagoon, mixed together with blues and greens. The children have added seaweed and shells to the bottom to give it the perfect sea finish. They worked amazingly as a team, helping each other to paint their boxes, snip the tape and cut out the fishes. Once one was made, they all wanted one! We love it when children take charge of their learning.















In Maths, we have been looking at measures. We have made worms with the playdough and have been using mathematical language to describe their size and length. We could make worms that were longer and shorter and ordered worms from smallest to longest.





In phonics we have been continuing to hear the initial sounds in words. This is something we are finding very tricky so we keep practising. We have also been looking at rhyming words and can think of words that rhyme. We realised it is the end of the word we need to listen carefully to and have tried to think of the funniest nonsense rhyming words!

We have continued to explore the great outdoors. We have been talking about adventures we have enjoyed with our families and any camping experiences we have had. We have enjoyed exploring the campsite in the tuff tray. The fairies even came and created a fairy garden.



Reception

We started the week looking at mini beasts and what we know about mini beasts. The children have enjoyed sharing what their favourite mini beast is and why. We have looked at some interesting and informative non-fiction books to help improve our knowledge of mini beasts and to learn some new facts.

Now the weather is hopefully getting warmer, we have had a move around in our garden space. The children have loved having more room to use the large-scale construction blocks, creating houses, buses, thrones etc.














Our pea plants are growing quickly and will be coming home with your child this week. Attached are some instructions to help you and your child care for your delicious pea plant at home.






In Maths, the children were introduced to fractions. They have worked on recognising and finding half of an object, shape and quantity.







It has been another super-busy week in Year 2!

In our science lessons, we conducted an interesting investigation to discover what a plant needs to grow and be healthy. The children worked collaboratively in teams to plant seeds under different conditions. Some children were not allowed to water their seeds, while others were without soil. Some seeds were placed in a warm, sunny spot, and finally, some were left in a dark cupboard. We eagerly anticipate observing the outcomes of this experiment.





In our English lessons, the children showcased their creative writing skills by crafting their own speeches. The topic of discussion was whether lessons about the environment should be a regular feature in school curriculums. It was delightful to witness the enthusiasm and dedication with which the children approached this task, producing some truly compelling arguments.

Art lessons this week focused on the exploration of texture within paintings. Children experimented with adding different materials to paint, as well as exploring various brush strokes to create visually interesting textures. It was wonderful to see their creativity and artistic expression flourish during these sessions.















Wow what a busy week Year 3 have had! We were split into Team Tiger and Team Penguin. School have sponsored two animals through WWF specifically for the Year 3s. We have researched endangered animals, created origami, found out how we can help save the animals on the critical list and even had a movie night! The finale will be an art show for the KS1 and KS2 children to come and wonder at our creations.
